Bishop's Letter: Faith forged on the anvil of doubt:

This summer has seen celebrations in Lincolnshire to mark the 200th anniversary of the birth of Alfred Lord Tennyson at Somersby Rectory near Horncastle.

Tennyson remains one of the greatest poets in the English language, and as the poet Laureate he was one of the stars in the Victorian literacy firmament. Most people have read 'The Brook' (For men may come and men may go, but I go on for ever) and his invitation to 'Come into the garden Maud', is familiar to many of us. Lincolnshire is justifiably proud of one of its most illustrious sons, and interest in him is now as great as it has ever been.

But what about Tennyson's religious beliefs? Did he have any, and if so of what kind?

Well in many ways he was a man of his time embracing fairly conservative Victorian values and moral assumptions. But he was not a great church-goer, perhaps his experience at Somersby, where his father was the rector, did little to encourage him in that respect. Yet his son assures us that Tennyson studied the Bible, as all who knew his poems know, and he engaged readily with the liberal Christianity promoted by Charles Kingsley and F.D. Maurice.

However the publication of Darwin's 'Origin of the Species' did cause him to doubt some of the central claims of the Christian faith, even though he never doubted the existence of God, nor the reality of life after death. He wrote:

> We have but faith: we cannot know; For knowledge is of things we see: And yet we trust it comes from thee, A beam of darkness: let it grow.

In the light of these sentiments, T.S. Eliot was prompted to observe that Tennyson's greatest poem 'In Memoriam' is not religious because of the quality of its faith, but because of the quality of its doubt, and this is balanced by Kingsley's view that Tennyson held an orthodox Christian faith forged on the anvil of doubt.

It is this which makes Tennyson a man of our time as well as his own. He lived in an age of doubt yet it was his struggles with doubt which convinced him that faith would see him through life to something better.

On the plinth of his statue in the precincts of Lincoln Cathedral the following lines are inscribed. They sum up Tennyson's faith in nature as a window into a divine mystery beyond our comprehension but very real to us all the same:

> Flower in the crannied wall, I pluck you out of the crannies, I hold you here, root and all, in my hand, Little flower what if I could understand What you are, root and all, and all in all, I should know what God and man is.



Have you heard the story about a Samaritan?

No, it's hot a joke - it's a true story and repeated every week in Lincoln and 200 other branches in the country. The story is simply about a very ordinary volunteer called Sam, who offers to give up a few hours each week to go into the centre at Lincoln and sit in a nice comfortable seat with other colleagues in a quiet room and just wait by the telephones.

It is impossible to predict the calls. For no obvious reason, there are times when the 'phones hardly ring but other times can be very busy. Sometimes they are there for a few hours in the early morning, sometimes in the middle of the day or the evening, but occasionally in the

middle of the night when most of us are asleep. Who else can you talk to before the sun rises? Even if you close your eyes, the worries you have, at that time of day, can appear like the size of a mountain.

Sam usually has plenty of tea and coffee or cool drinks and often shares a little bit of personal news and chat with the other volunteers that are on duty at the same time. They come from many different backgrounds and have lots of interests. Some are young, some are retired, some have very busy but flexible lives, but they all share the same wish to give up some of their time to help and care for others and they have been trained to really listen to those who may telephone.

Sometimes during the daytime, a bell rings and Sam goes to answer the door to a visitor who may prefer to come in and sit down in a quiet room and talk about the things they are trying to deal with. It could be about relationships, bereavement, emotional or financial problems. Visitors are often grateful for the opportunity to sit down with someone who is not involved and has time to really listen to their problems.

Sam never judges and all that is said remains confidential. Perhaps for the very first time, the visitor is, able to talk about their real feelings and start to see their situation more clearly. It has been known for a caller to begin to work out for themselves what their alternatives may be and start thinking about their future possibilities.

The same happens for those on the telephone and also for one of Sam's colleagues called Jo, who is one of the volunteers answering the emails that some people prefer to send. Sam often helps Jo with the reply and for those who may want to send an old fashioned letter. Chris is usually the one who will write back.

Sam and the other volunteers are not expected to have all the answers - they often don't - they have no magic wand - they do not give advice – but they do have a lot of patience and understanding through their regular training and because they listen very carefully, it can sometimes help callers when they are able to talk about their feelings.

Occasionally, Sam may give a few extra hours to work in schools, and also talk to various group meetings about the work of Samaritans. Volunteers are very proud to talk about the roots of the organisation, which actually originated in Lincoln. There are other colleagues who help with publicity, admin., fundraising, recruitment and training. Donations are always gratefully accepted as it costs more than £70 every day just to keep the centre and telephone lines open.

At the end of a few hours, Sam goes home to get on with, what may be called, a normal life, having been there to give a little time for those who needed to talk in confidence about their own personal worries.



POLICE REPORT SEPTEMBER 2009

Unfortunately this month I have to report that there have been four burglaries in the area that we cover from Nettleham Police station. Three at Cherry Willingham, and one in Bardney. Burglary is a horrendous crime, which has a huge impact on the victims. It is a top priority for Lincolnshire Police to prevent burglaries and to identify and prosecute offenders. Every village is a potential target, please take steps to secure your property.

Keep car and other keys out of sight. Burglars will use a stick to grab what they can see through a letterbox or cat flap.

Make sure doors and windows are locked when you are out, and ground floor windows locked at night when you are in bed.

Look out for your neighbours – the best results we get in terms of catching offenders are when a neighbour reports suspicious activity immediately.

As I prepare this report Lincoln CID have arrested two males in regard to a number of burglaries including those at Cherry Willingham. Hopefully I'll have more of an update for you next month.

Also this month all parents of schools in our area will be receiving a letter about parking outside schools. Please read it and park considerately. Some of the parking I have seen defies belief. Please Park legally, safely and with consideration to residents near school. Tickets will be issued....

Finally I hope to be able to find some lads aged 13 to 17 from our villages to take part in a Fair Play football league at Cherry Willingham from Friday 2nd October for 8 weeks. The emphasis will be on Fair Play rather than just winning and losing. The aim is to improve behaviour and attitudes amongst participants.
