Women's World Day of Prayer 2010 'Let everything that has breath praise God'

The Women's World Day of Prayer service this year will take place at St. Peter and St. Paul's Church Reepham at 7pm on Friday 5th of March.

We have this service each year and move around the Anglican and Methodist churches in our Benefice.

The service this year has been written by a committee of women from the Republic of Cameroon, a country situated in the Gulf of Guinea and part of the African continent. The population of the country is just over 17 million, but the life expectancy is only 51. Over 60% of Cameroonians are younger than 25. There are 240 ethnic groups and languages but the official languages are French and English. The capital city is Yaounde.

The country has a wide range of natural resources, and produces, oil, rubber, bauxite, cotton, timber, bananas, coffee, and oilseed. Many of the women are involved with farming, the tourist industry and with the food processing industry.

60% of the population are Christian and above half of the church membership is female. These women meet in fellowship groups, where they carry out seminars and workshops to fight against poverty. They teach others small scale projects like soap making, preparation of smoked fish, fruit preservation, and tiedyeing fabric.

In 1983 Cameroon signed the UN convention on the elimination of all forms of discrimination against women. This constitution promotes equality between men and women and provides equal rights in the areas of inheritance, credit and employment. However traditional rights often discriminate against women.

The women are very much involved in the struggle for peace, justice and integrity. They assist HIV, AIDS and leprosy patients and put all their talents and resources at the disposal of their children who are at the centre of their lives.

Thus these women make a difference to the economy, politics and religious activities of their country.

Cameroon is a beautiful and fascinating country. Like other countries it is emerging from its traditional background into the complexities of the modern age. The people are moving forward with courage and determination without losing any of their distinctive characteristics.

Why not join us at the service on 5^{th} March to learn more, and to worship using the same service booklet as other Christians all over the world.

It is not just a service for ladies; women, men, boys and girls are equally welcome.

L.I.V.E.S. FIRST RESPONDERS (Group 26)

Welcome to the first instalment of 2010 and our best wishes for the Year ahead.

Since the re-formation of the local group it has been a busy time; the team continues to expand and we now have six First Responders, with two more in the process of joining. In addition to this, the group has seen two members undertake further training to level 3 status (Intermediate), which means they can now attend children under 12yrs of age, Road Traffic Collisions and a number of other potentially life threatening emergencies.

We hope you never need our assistance! But who and what is a LIVES First Responder? In your local group we currently have a Helicopter Pilot (Dave), Shop Owner (Steve), Transport Manager (Ben), Retired Fire Officer (Phil), Trainee Paramedic (Lee – "the good looking one"), and a Qualified Nurse (another Dave). We are all volunteers, who are trained by staff trainers from the East Midlands Ambulance Service (EMAS) and LIVES own trainers; to deal with Life Threatening and other Emergencies, and in the event of someone having a Heart Attack to give early Basic Life Support (CPR), Defibrillation and Oxygen support, prior to the arrival of paramedics and ambulance staff.

How vital is this support? Judge for yourself – It can take between 4 and 12 minutes travelling time even with sirens and blue lights, for an ambulance to reach any part of our operational area, and research shows that for every minute that passes where the person having a heart attack is without intervention, their chances of survival reduce by 10%.

How does it work? That's easy – when you ring 999 for an ambulance, the LIVES controller will make a decision to alert your local responder on duty, who is also notified of the nature of the emergency (*This does not delay the ambulance*) and asked to attend.

In the period January 1st to December 15th 2009 we have attended 83 calls, in support of residents in our area, and we hope to be able to offer more cover in the coming months as the group expands. You do not need any particular previous experience or qualifications, and you fit it in around your everyday life; so if you are at home during the day, and can give some of this time to LIVES, we would be delighted to hear from you; Male or Female so long as you are over 18yrs of age. If you are interested in becoming a First Responder or have any other queries, please contact **Phil Staples the group co-ordinator on 01522 750303.**

Vacancy - If being a First Responder is not for you, you can support us in other ways; we are currently looking for a group Fundraiser to work alongside the Treasurer in raising and managing group funds. You do not have to have experience, only a small amount of time (to suit you) each month, and the enthusiasm to work with a dedicated and supportive team.

Other ways to help! As a charity your local LIVES group depends on its financial supporters, and is reliant upon them for its continued development and expansion; if you would like to help in this way, again please contact the group co-ordinator and ask about becoming a "Friend of LIVES"; it will cost you less than 39p per week, and entitles you to some freebies and regular newsletters, to keep you up to date with what is happening and how your donations are working.

If you can't donate the money – donate the time! (Thanks Steve)

For those that supported us in so many ways throughout 2009, can I offer my thanks again on behalf of the group, as we look forward to supporting the community in 2010.

Police News: Happy New Year from Donnah and Jackie.

Pc 440 Dave Morgan the Community Beat Manager for the area is currently in Lincoln as an Acting Sergeant. This is a temporary posting and in his absence I have taken over. I have 8 years experience within Lincolnshire Police, having worked in Lincoln, Gainsborough and Saxilby. If anyone would like to get in touch to discuss any aspect of Policing then please feel free and I will do my best to assist.

I would like to bring to everyone's attention the new non-emergency number for the public to contact the police. The new number is 0300 111 0300, this is to report any new ongoing incident or crime in the first instance. Local Police are then allocated to deal with your call if necessary and will get in touch. In the event of an emergency then off course dial 999.

Whilst I have been driving around the area during the bad weather I have been a little shocked especially in the early mornings, to see people driving with iced up, misted up and even snowed up windscreens. I appreciate that it can take time to clear windscreens in the morning when it is cold outside, but it would take an awful lot longer to get where you were going if you had a collision with someone because of it. If you were to have a collision and Police were able to prove that you had driven with an obstructed view because of any of these reasons you could find yourself being prosecuted. Hopefully we will not have too much more snow this year, but another thing to consider is large amounts on the roof of vehicles. It is an idea to clear the bulk of snow from your roof to. As the vehicle warms up the snow on the roof tends to slide off, and when braking can slide down the windscreen, again momentarily obstructing your view.

Another thing to think about during this cold spell, is leaving your engine running to warm up your vehicle, please DO NOT leave your vehicle unattended with the keys in!! This is an open invitation to thieves and may well invalidate your insurance if the worst happen.

During these dark and cold winter nights, I would also like to draw everyone's attention to his or her safety when travelling by cycle or in fact out walking or running. We have had a few instances recently when cyclists riding without lights and dressed in dark clothing have had near misses with vehicles on the roads around the area. It is especially worrying this time of year with the icy roads and pavements. If parents can ensure that their children are appropriately dressed, INCLUDING helmets it would be much appreciated by us. The same can be said for the fitness addicts locally, please do not walk or run in dark clothing in the early evenings/early mornings, although most run on pavements there are occasions when you need to cross roads and when you're dressed all in black it is difficult for drivers to see you. Lets keep this area a safe place to cycle and keep fit.

One of the many schemes the Police implement is, 'nominated neighbour', any persons that are elderly or vulnerable can be especially vulnerable this time of year. The scheme is designed to protect people from door step and rogue traders, but this time of year can also assist by keeping an eye on people that maybe effected by the weather. If you are happy to help with this scheme then we would like to hear from you. It does not take up a lot of your time and will greatly benefit the quality of life of the elderly and vulnerable. A few examples of how a nominated neighbour can help is being able to check an individuals credentials, if the neighbour was visited by British Gas and was unable to read or was not happy with the ID card then they would explain that they would ask a neighbour to call to check for them. If the visitor is genuine they are happy to wait, a rogue trader would probably prefer not to. At this time of year too it maybe that you could help make sure your neighbour is warm and have their essential food items in. I would also like to mention, parking, outside of schools at the start and end of the day. Jackie, myself and colleagues will be visiting all schools at the appropriate times and will be issuing tickets to any vehicle parked within a designated school safety zone, on a footpath or causing an obstruction. The reason for the enforcement is for the safety of children, pedestrians and other road users. I know there has been a lot of publicity by the schools and the police about the parking issues but it would appear that not everyone who drives their children to and from school has read it.

<u>Current Neighbourhood Panel Priorities</u>; The Team currently have two priorities: Anti Social Behaviour – Nettleham. This is predominately looking at the Mulsanne Park area and also the Car Park at the rear of the Co-op Store. Anti Social Behaviour – Fiskerton. This is involving damage and anti social behaviour in the area of the Village Hall. Thank You
