VICAR'S BLOG:

'Change and decay, in all around I see' – words from the well known hymn 'Abide with Me'. It doesn't sound the most hopeful of hymns, does it, but the point it tries to make is that whilst things change around us, and sometimes decays, God doesn't change and remains as the foundation of life for those who believe. Change is something that we all have to adapt to. We live in a world whose only constant is change and it seems to me that (although this could be because I am getting older!) the pace of change just seems to get faster. Who would have thought, even 20 years ago-, that we could download books onto our phones and read them, or never have to go to a supermarket because we can buy on line ... and so it goes on

The church changes too. It has to change – it always has changed, sometimes more slowly than people want it to. Our church buildings reflect that. Most of our churches have something of every century in them as the needs of the worshipping congregations and the communities have adapted to a different context. Nothing is static.

Why am I thinking about change? Well because we are in a period of change in our group of churches as we double in size from four churches to eight. By the time you read this that will already have happened. The way we look at that could be with an air of pessimism – it's a reflection of dwindling numbers etc etc. The way I am looking at it though, is to reflect on what God is doing and what opportunities this may present to share the good news of the gospel and to work with other churches. Of course there will be challenges. Sundays will be different, but I am delighted that we have found a pattern of services that meet the needs of most people. But just as a warning, I am looking for new things! We are beginning Family Worship in Cherry Willingham and I am also looking for a slot for some more contemporary worship.

Just seven things have crossed my path since two months ago.

<u>The Short ferry residents</u> have set up a Residents Association .With luck, it may help them get a proper footpath to the bus stop and a shelter as well. I keep driving past similar shelters and pavements in other parts of the county that cannot get anything like the use Short Ferry or Ferry Rd will generate

<u>Voluntary Centre Services</u>. I had my first contact with the organisation a week or so ago. It is funded by WLDC and LCC and others and is there to help those who are either running volunteer groups or looking to set them up. I had no idea of the scope of the activities covered and the brilliant leadership skills of those running the groups. VCS hold forums for networking and for those with funds to give out a chance to explain what is available. If you are involved in any such activity or would like to get something started why not contact Gill or Heather on 01427 613470.

<u>Paths and foot paths.</u> The poor pavements and kerbs in much of the village have again cropped up. I do not know how much of the village will be covered by the current work but the infrequent mowing of footpaths is a problem that will be with us a long time. The County Council says two mowings a year and that is it. We need more, we pay our council tax, we need to get something organised.

<u>Library closures</u>. What is planned at Cherry will affect us as will the reduced hours of the mobile library. The so called consultation document looks like a done deal to me – a take it or leave it- approach- what are your views? Please share them with me.

<u>Planning applications Application No 130066</u>. WLDC Planning-tracker- An application has been made for change of use on part of the airfield. A number of people have objected to me at the siting of a container close to the war memorial. I have requested that the container is moved much further back from the road and that it is screened with trees. By the time you see this the decision will have been made.

<u>Cutbacks and wasted money</u>. The Government is blamed for the spending cuts causing so much pain but much of the blame is also here at a local level. The Incinerator is going to cost LCC some £15 million every year irrespective of how much waste is sent in. West Norfolk District Council have just tied up a deal which turns all the plastic to a reusable material and uses an AD processor for the food waste. It will cost WNDC nothing NOTHING. **WLDC needs to save £1 M per year- any ideas.**

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Please be advised that these are notes of the meeting taken by the Clerk and cannot in any way be regarded as the official minutes of Council proceedings until they are approved and signed at the next meeting. PARISH COUNCIL- 24th May, 2013

- Contrary to rumours circulating in the village, the Parish Council has no intention of implementing a Dog Control Order
- The Clerk was asked to contact:-
 - (1) LCC Highways, Environment Agency and LCC Footpaths about the bar obstructing the gate on the river bank near Five Mile Bridge possible suggestion is to put a moveable bar with a notice attached to the gate asking walkers to replace when through the gate
 - (2) Environment Agency and Witham Third IDB about the condition of the riverbank. The level of the bank needs surveying as a matter of urgency as it appears to have dropped due to the use of an excavator and there may be a potential flood risk
 - (3) LCC Economy and Culture re proposed changes to library provision; suggested changes will see both Fiskerton and Short Ferry lose mobile library provision by May, 2014
 - (4) WLDC Chief Executive and Planning Enforcement Department re the failure to arrange for the repair/replacement of the fence on the open space, Holmfield
- Planning permission has been granted for a single storey extension to form garage and single storey rear extension to form kitchen at Mayrofen, 64 Ferry Road
- A widening scheme for part of Ferry Road towards Short Ferry is planned by LCC Highways but they are unable to indicate when this will be undertaken.
- ➤ Police presence in the village Although police officers would like to be able to walk around the village, they have indicated that they have neither the time nor resources. They are incident-led and have to respond as such.
- ➤ Date of Next Meeting: Monday 29th July, 2013, 7.30 p.m. in the village hall

PARISH COUNCIL- 29th July, 2013

- The Clerk was asked to contact:-
 - (5) LCC Highways, re the condition of the footpath and road outside 17 Church View Crescent
 - (6) Acis re an overhanging hedge on High Meadows
 - (7) LCC Footpaths re cutting back the overgrown hedging on the public footpath across the field from Corn Close to Hall Lane
 - (8) WLDC Planning, asking that the proposed storage container on the airfield be situated 200 metres away from the War Memorial. This would show respect for the memorial and would be hidden by a bush
 - (9) LCC Transport Section with a petition asking that a bus shelter be erected on Ferry Road opposite Corn Close
- Residents are reminded that maintaining hedges/trees/shrubs is the responsibility of the owner/occupier of that property.
- A kissing gate has been installed where the stile was near Five Mile Bridge
- Parish Councillors are to see what can be done to replace the broken down fence on the open space at Holmfield
- ➤ The Parish Council has been given a donation of £1000 in the memory of Mr. D. Welsh to be used for any purpose that supports village community life. Discussions will take place at the next meeting as to how this money can be best used
- Councillors are looking to provide blue and black wheelie bins for the new teenage shelter in an effort to keep the area tidy
- ➤ Grant funding has been awarded for a bus shelter and it is hoped that one similar to the one in Reepham can be installed. The proposed site near High Meadows was confirmed as this stop is used by all buses going through the village
- > RoSPA will conduct an inspection of the play area during August, 2013
- ➤ Carriage maintenance works on the B1202 and B1202/C004 junctions will be carried out for approximately three nights from 9th September, 2013. Between the hours of 7.00 p.m. and 6.00 a.m. there will be a temporary road closure. The road will be open to traffic outside of the working times
- ➤ Date of Next Meeting: 16th September, 2013, 7.30 p.m. in the village hall

Flu Vaccinations Programme

We hope to commence our flu campaign towards the end of September. Following the continual success of our Saturday morning flu clinics, we shall again be running our flu clinics on various Saturday mornings throughout October at both Nettleham and Cherry Willingham surgeries. We will be providing limited Thursday evening clinics at Nettleham for those patients who genuinely cannot attend on a Saturday. Vaccination is available for patients who fit one of the criteria listed below:

Aged 65 or over Have Chronic Heart Disease Have Chronic Liver Disease Have Diabetes

Have Chronic Respiratory Disease (including Asthma when regularly using an inhaled steroid)

Have Chronic Renal Disease Have Suppressed Immune Systems Are a Carer Have Multiple Sclerosis Currently pregnant

Please contact either surgery from the beginning of September to book an appointment in one of the flu clinics.

There is no need to wait until you receive a letter. If you fit into one of the criteria listed above, please contact the surgery to make an appointment.

NEW SHINGLES VACCINE COMING TO A SURGERY NEAR YOU!

From September 2013, there will be a new national shingles immunisation programme, for people aged 70 years old, and a 'catch-up' programme will commence.

This year's 'catch up' will include anyone who is 79 years old (born September 1933 – September 1934 inclusive).

It is not currently recommended for adults aged 80 years and above, as the efficiency of the vaccine is reduced in this age group.

Shingles is caused by the re-activation of the chicken-pox (varicella) virus, sometimes decades after the initial infection. It can occur at any age, but is most common in older people. The severity also increases with age, and it can lead to ongoing nerve pain (post hepetic neuralgia).

The vaccine helps to prevent shingles and reduces the painful after effects. It is a one dose injection, usually given in the upper arm. It can be given regardless of having had shingles before.

If you are entitled to this vaccine, this year, you will be sent an invitation from the surgery. Due to limited vaccine supply, you will not yet be able to have the vaccine if you are not in the current age groups (above). However, the 'catch up' will be rolled out, eventually to include all 70-79 year olds.

Some people may not be able to have the vaccine, due to it being a 'live' vaccine. This will include people who have reduced immunity due to certain medical conditions or specific medications. Your doctor can advise you if you should not have the vaccine.

We are hoping to provide short weekly singles vaccine sessions at both Cherry Willingham and Nettleham surgeries, and some Saturday morning clinics. We will not be able to give this vaccine at the same time as your annual flu jab.

Nettleham Police Team:

Fiskerton has been a quiet village this month but there have been a number of bicycle thefts in our area some, where bikes have been recovered but the Police have no idea who they belong to as they are not marked in any way.

Your local neighbourhood policing team can mark your bike and you can also get a bike passport from them, below is a guide to keeping your bike safe.

Cycling is a healthy and environmentally friendly way to travel to work, school or around town. However, more than 500,000 bikes are stolen in the UK each year because they're poorly secured or not secured at all.

How do I store my bike at home?

Keep your bike out of sight - more than half of all bikes are taken from the owner's property.

If your bike is stored in a shed or garage...

- keep the door locked
- fit a good quality padlock to the door, using non-return screws
- cover windows with old curtains and fit wire mesh inside
- install a shed/garage alarm

• lock your bike with two locks to a ground anchor

How do I protect my bike?

- get a good bike lock (D-locks, thick cable locks or combination locks are the most secure) look for Sold Secure Ltd approved locks, or ask the bike shop for a recommendation
- take removable fittings with you
- always secure both the frame and wheels to an immovable object, such as a bike rack or tree
- consider having your bike security-marked or engraved
- photograph your bike, take down all your bike details in the bike passport and keep it in a safe place
- find and note your bike serial number usually on crankshaft, underneath pedals
- insure your bike, either on contents insurance or separately
- vary your routine: lock up your bike in different ways and places
- lock your bike every time you leave it, even for a few minutes, don't lose it
- ideally, use two different types of locks a thief will need more tools to steal it
- think about where you leave it: lock in a busy, well-lit place, in view of other people or CCTV cameras
- make the bike and lock hard to move when parked

Extra security measures

Security mark items that have financial or sentimental value - it will make it easier for the police to identify them and return them to you.

Marking your property may also act as a deterrent to thieves, who do not want to be caught holding or passing on stolen items. You can mark your items by:

- using a UV pen (available at most stationery shops)
- engraving or etching your property
- using a forensic marking solution.
