

Vicar's Blog:

I guess that for many of you reading this, you are feeling that summer is coming to an end, the children are about to go back to school and hopefully are reflecting on some great weather, some fun and, if you were fortunate, some time away from the normal pace of life.

This summer seems to have been one of calms and storms, in all sorts of ways. The summer sunshine has been interrupted by stormy weather. I had a very eventful journey back from Nottingham last Friday, trying to find my way back in a storm that flooded the roads causing flash floods and it was impossible to drive through three or four feet of water that drains just could not clear fast enough. The answer – stop and wait!

However, some have suffered far more serious storms than a longer than expected journey. Whilst most of us bathe in freedom and plenty, some in the world have been living in the storm of war, persecution and in fear of their lives. The situation in the Middle East is horrifying. It seems to me that evil has broken out. At some point enormous courage will be needed from the leadership of these nations to do something different and create a path for peace. Meanwhile in Western Africa we are reminded of the poverty of those who are fighting the deadly disease, Ebola and discovering that trying to stop it in its tracks needs far more resource than they could possibly have imagined.

I was pondering all these events when I again came across the account of Elijah in the Old Testament. Elijah, a prophet – they weren't popular people – he had prophesied three years of famine and it came, he faced off the prophets of Mount Carmel, that upset Jezebel who vowed to have him killed. Elijah fled to the mountain in fear of his life. He went there to meet with God, who sent earthquake, wind and fire – but God didn't speak to him in those storms, in the end came a still small voice – a voice that asked him a very simple question: 'What are you doing here Elijah?'. That's a very simple but profound question that all of us of whatever faith or none, need to ask ourselves sometimes – what are we doing here? The answer to it may uncover the real desires of our hearts, it may help us to uncover our motivations, and who knows it may help us to hold back from some of the things we know are wrong. Whether we are in the middle of storm or sunshine, whatever its cause, stopping, listening and answering that question is a good strategy for life. Every blessing,







PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

PARISH COUNCIL/ANNUAL PARISH MEETING – 30th June, 2014

- Residents have been complaining of cars parked on and obstructing footpaths. This should be reported to the Police.
- Works to the double gates at the play area and installing posts for securing wheelie bins at the teen shelter are to wait until the results of the RoSPA Annual Inspection are received.
- The Parish Council formally agreed to form a Neighbourhood Plan and WLDC has been informed accordingly.
- The Parish Council has been told by WLDC that, as they had not received sufficient nominations to hold an election, the Parish Council should look to co-opt another Parish Councillor. Advertisements have been placed around the village.
- Remedial works to the teen shelter have been agreed: the broken glass will be replaced, the seating will be boarded in and slabs will be put in front of the shelter. District Councillor Darcel kindly offered to use some of his District Councillor Initiative Fund money.
- The survey by Lark Energy of the village and scout halls' roofs for possible solar panels is scheduled for 4th July. The starting time for the solar farm is estimated as the end of July and should take approximately 16-20 weeks.
- The Clerk was asked to contact: (1) Fiskerton PCC re the possibility of planting a memorial tree to Kipper Scott at the far end of the new churchyard and (2) LCC Footpaths re an overgrown footpath from Nelson Road towards the river bank
- District Councillor Darcel reported that he had contacted (1) the Environment Agency re cows on the river bank, (2) LCC to get the overgrown hedge between Hall Lane and the old Tanya entrance cut back and (3) WLDC over the exclusion zone at Primetake.
- Planning permission has been granted to (1) extend the site from five pitches to ten for touring caravans and conversion of existing washhouse to WC, shower and information centre facility at Diamond House, Ferry Road and (2) demolish existing garage outbuildings and replace with new garage and study at The Rectory, Reephram Road.
- Date of Next Meeting: 30th June, 2014 in the village hall at 7.30 p.m.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

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PARISH COUNCIL/ANNUAL PARISH MEETING – 14th July, 2014

- Councillors were asked (1) if there were any fund raising or similar projects young people can get involved in. District Councillor Darcel said there may be projects in connection with the Village Hall as most community groups are run from there. Councillor Mrs. Howard said that volunteers are always needed for the fortnightly run Luncheon Club. The Club will start again in September, with dates being put in the Parish News. (2) if there were any plans to get a footpath towards Cherry Willingham. This has been asked for many times from LCC Highways. The Witham Access Group is trying to look at providing footpaths around Cherry Willingham, Reepham and Fiskerton.
- A resident was very concerned about the state of highways, footpaths and gutters being filled with grass cuttings. The Chairman said that the Parish Council agreed with these concerns and had requested remedial works on many occasions. He advised her to contact County Councillor I. Fleetwood and Alan Brown, LCC Area Highways Officer who will be attending the November meeting.
All village residents are encouraged to contact LCC and WLDC if they have any complaints but the first ports of call should be the District and County Councillors (chris@darcel.entadsl.com and ifleet@barlings.demon.co.uk). Potholes need to be reported to LCC – either by phone, letter or via the LCC website
- The Clerk was asked to contact (1) Veolia ES (UK) Ltd about the standard of grass cutting, (2) LCC Highways re complaints about condition of village roads and footpaths, (3) LCC and Stagecoach about lack of disabled/wheelchair access on buses
- Neighbourhood Plan: a report is currently being circulated to all households. Areas of development have been identified and it is important that all villagers have a say in what is required; this can include highway maintenance and safety. The Plan will be adopted by WLDC and will have to stand for approximately 20 years so it is important that everything needed is included.
- All present at the meeting were dismayed to find out that all the benches have been ripped out of the teen shelter. A lot of money has been spent by District Councillor Darcel from his District Councillor Initiative Fund and by the Parish Council. Planned works to shutter in the benches, slab the front of the shelter and secure the wheelie bins will go ahead but decisions will have to be made on how to proceed in the future.
- The village and scout hall solar panel surveys have been undertaken. The village hall received a good EPC rating and should be suitable for solar panels but the scout hall needs improvement.
- Members of the Council decided against purchasing a strimmer for grass cutting. It was hoped that the village could get volunteers to pick up litter.
- Following complaints about traffic on Plough Lane and Blacksmiths Lane, Alan Brown from LCC Highways is to consider available options and respond in due course. He is concerned that the unfinished road at The Close represents a hazard to highway users across the site entrance and is to discuss this problem with WLDC Planning Enforcement officers.
- Councillor Fleetwood reported that a pressure group has been started in Cherry Willingham and Reepham opposed to the proposed bridge on Hawthorn Road. Unless the bypass works are started by March 2015 there could be a potential loss of funding. The Secretary of State has not upheld proposed library closures.
- There have been no applicants for the parish councillor vacancy. WLDC have advised retaining the advert open ended.
- Date of Next Meeting: 15th September, 2014 in the village hall at 7.30 p.m.

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Creation of public service hub:

Building works to remodel the ground floor are due to start on 18 August, so that Job Centre Plus (JCP) can move into the Guildhall at Marshall's Yard. It will be the start of transforming the West Lindsey District Council building into a public services hub, providing a one-stop shop for residents and customers.

Initially those services occupying the ground floor will have to move to other accommodation. Some of these moves will be permanent and some temporary.

The Voluntary Service Centre will move to new office space on the first floor, and this move will be permanent.

It is planned that the customer services will move at close of business on Friday 15 August at 4.30pm and will reopen in their new first floor temporary reception on Monday 18 August.

The main and the side entrances will be closed and a new temporary entrance set up on Spring Gardens (opposite the RWB accountants). A council officer will be able available to help and advise customers when they enter the building at the temporary entrance. Work on the ground floor will start during week of 11 August, but this will be areas that have no impact on reception. Biggest change to voter registration in a generation

Take control as Individual Electoral Registration will give people more control over the process and increase the accuracy of the register. The next step towards a voting system fit for the 21st century has arrived as Electoral Registration Officers (EROs) prepare to contact voters across the UK about the changes to the electoral register.

Individual Electoral Registration (IER) will give people more control and ownership over the process and increase the accuracy of the register – with the new system able to verify that everyone on the register is who they say they are. This will make sure that there is greater trust in the legitimacy and fairness of our elections. This change gets rid of the outdated ‘head of household’ registration system and places electoral registration in the hands of individuals. Members of the public will be contacted by their local ERO to inform them of what, if anything, they need to do next.

Today also marks the launch of a TV, online and billboard public awareness campaign by the Electoral Commission to raise awareness of the changes.

The process is supported by a new online system launched last month which makes registering easier than ever. People can now register by simply providing their name, address, date of birth and National Insurance number in what is a secure, convenient, and modern way of registering to vote.

Register to vote now.

Minister of State at the Cabinet Office Greg Clark said: “It is only right that in a country which has such a long and proud history of democratic participation, we ensure that we have an electoral registration system fit for the 21st century.

“These changes ensure that individuals register securely and enable them to register in the simplest possible way. Under the new system, around 80% of those already on the electoral register will be automatically added after their name and address is matched against existing government records. Those people who are not successfully matched may need to provide additional information to be registered, but thanks to the new online electoral registration system, this is now a quick and easy process that takes as little as 3 minutes.”

MAIN DUTIES OF A GOVERNOR

Governors are not expected to be involved in the day to day management and administration of the school but rather to set strategic plans for the school and to provide the Headteacher with guidance on general principles.

- To work as a member of the Governing Body for the best interests of the school
- Attend regular meetings and special meetings of the Governing Body as well as meetings of any Committees to which they have been appointed
- Become familiar with general educational issues and responsibilities of a Governor
- Take an interest in school activities
- Promote the school within the local community
- Be able to commit time to the duties and responsibilities of a Governor
- Be prepared to become involved in:
 - Staff appointments
 - Pupil discipline
 - The school curriculum
 - The financial management of the school
 - Health and safety matters
 - Governor training

Governors have an increasingly important role, attending termly meetings only is not enough. It is essential that the person appointed must have and maintain a keen interest in the work and welfare of the school. Inevitably visits must be made to see the Head teacher and what the school is doing; to play an active part in the public and social life of the school. Governors also have the task of being the immediate 'lay' support for the professional staff in the school.

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VOLUNTEER DRIVERS NEEDED for FISKERTON. This is URGENT:

Two months ago our Fiskerton based driver resigned and we have not yet managed to find a replacement. **This is a request for volunteer drivers.**

It is really important that the people of Fiskerton know that they have a local person who will come and collect them, take them to either surgery, wait for them and take them home afterwards.

We really do need 2 or 3 drivers - male or female - with a 4 door car who would be prepared to give one or two days a week on a regular basis. Of course there is no guarantee that they would be needed every day they offer, but it would be handy to know that they are available if an emergency job arises.

At the present moment the patients are having to pay extra to get to the surgery for their appointment because the drivers we are having to use come from further afield.

Please give some thought to volunteering in this way. If you feel you can help then please leave your contact details with one of the receptionists at either surgery and I will make contact with you and discuss some of the finer points of the scheme.

Well done gang!

Photo taken Tuesday morning, 29th July, So they can do it! Whether the intention of taking the seating out was to sweep the floor is doubtful but it certainly made the task much easier. So it can be done and I would like to thank the young people who pushed the broom.

We do have a problem with litter! In the eleven years I have been a resident, litter and vandalism has been a problem. It is much better now with most of the litter ending up in the youth shelter, where it should and could be easy to deal with. Now, there is now relatively little litter between say High Meadows and the shop or from shop down to Five Mile Lane. People are still emptying litter from their cars by the bridge and fly tipping in the lane. But litter and vandalism seem less bad now than for much of the time I have been here.

What is the solution? There probably is none, so all we can hope to do is manage the situation. It is not only teenagers who drop litter. Much younger members of our community do, and have got pleasure from up ending litter bins and adults leave little polythene bags of dog mess all over the place.

As you will be aware, as a District Councillor I have an Initiative Fund to spend in the ward. So far I have spent some £2000 on the youth shelter. It is substantially less than half it would have cost to buy a finished structure and the teenagers built it themselves. Unfortunately, the damage done in the New Year is still not fully rectified and if I was a teen ager I would be dispirited. The Parish Council has agreed to my spending a further £800 plus VAT on boxing in the seating and extending the paving slabs and tidying up the damage that was done at Christmas.

I would like to see more done for our youths. As one observer put it: There is nothing for them to do, they must be bored out of their minds. We all know where that leads and they are too young and do not have the experience to make things happen for themselves.

With regards litter I did want to spend a further £1000 on an "Overton" petrol powered wheelie bin mounted vacuum cleaner, a mower and storage unit. The "hoover" would have been brilliant for collecting the rubbish round the hall, in the hedge rows and down by 5 Mile Bridge, and a mower/trimmer for the extra cuts necessary to keep the footpaths down to the river usable. Several Volunteers offered their services but insurance, maintenance and storage were deemed to be a major obstacle. Perhaps the village will have to follow in Cherry's footsteps and pay a litter picker and a contractor for the extra grass cutting.

Which brings me to pride in the village. We have a lovely village and numerous residents would like to see the roads and pavements, kerbs and verges maintained to a higher standard and a number, myself included, seeing the village raise its ball game and taking part in the best kept village competition. Perhaps in a year or two! One very supportive resident has suggested much more attractive welcoming signs to the village and, perhaps, like Greetwell we could have some planters to welcome you home.

As you will have seen from my flier, I did have to find a home for some of my initiative fund and hopefully between the two parishes I now have it allocated. Unfortunately, the fund cannot be rolled over from one year to the next and if it is not spent in the village it will go else-where. With regards the Hall I have had some interest in table tennis, a barn dance, line dancing, a pre-school group. There must be many more interest groups who might wish to use the hall on an occasional basis i.e. in history, archaeology, model aeroplanes, trains, bowls, whist , bridge or scrabble, a twinning group and I would like to use my fund to help them get started.

Lastly the Neighbourhood Plan. It is highly unlikely we will ever please everyone or get all we want, but it is most important we take charge of the future of the village. If left to developers, it will be annexed to Cherry Willingham as part of an extended dormitory for Lincoln. We are lucky, we have a qualified architect in the team, Bill Roberts. Knowing Bill I am confident we will end up with a plan that keeps the character of the village and provide us with all the extras we need. Please keep the group informed of things that are important to you and join in the fray.



FLU VACCINATIONS

It's that time of year again when the practice once again start to plan the flu clinics. We are pleased to announce that our Flu Vaccination clinics will begin at the end of September and run periodically until the middle of November. Influenza is a virus causing a lung or respiratory infection. While for most people it is only an unpleasant illness that should pass in about a week, it can cause serious complications, particularly in young children and older adults. Getting a flu vaccination is the most effective way to stop you catching flu and passing it on to others.

Vaccination is available for patients who fit one of the criteria listed below:

- Pregnant (at any stage of the pregnancy)
- Children aged 2, 3 or 4 years of age (the vaccination is delivered via nasal spray rather than injection)
- A Carer (If you are the main carer for an elderly or disabled person, their well-being could be placed at risk should you fall ill)
- Aged 65 years or over
- Aged 6 months and over **and** suffer from any of the following conditions:
- Chronic respiratory disease
- Chronic heart disease
- Chronic kidney disease
