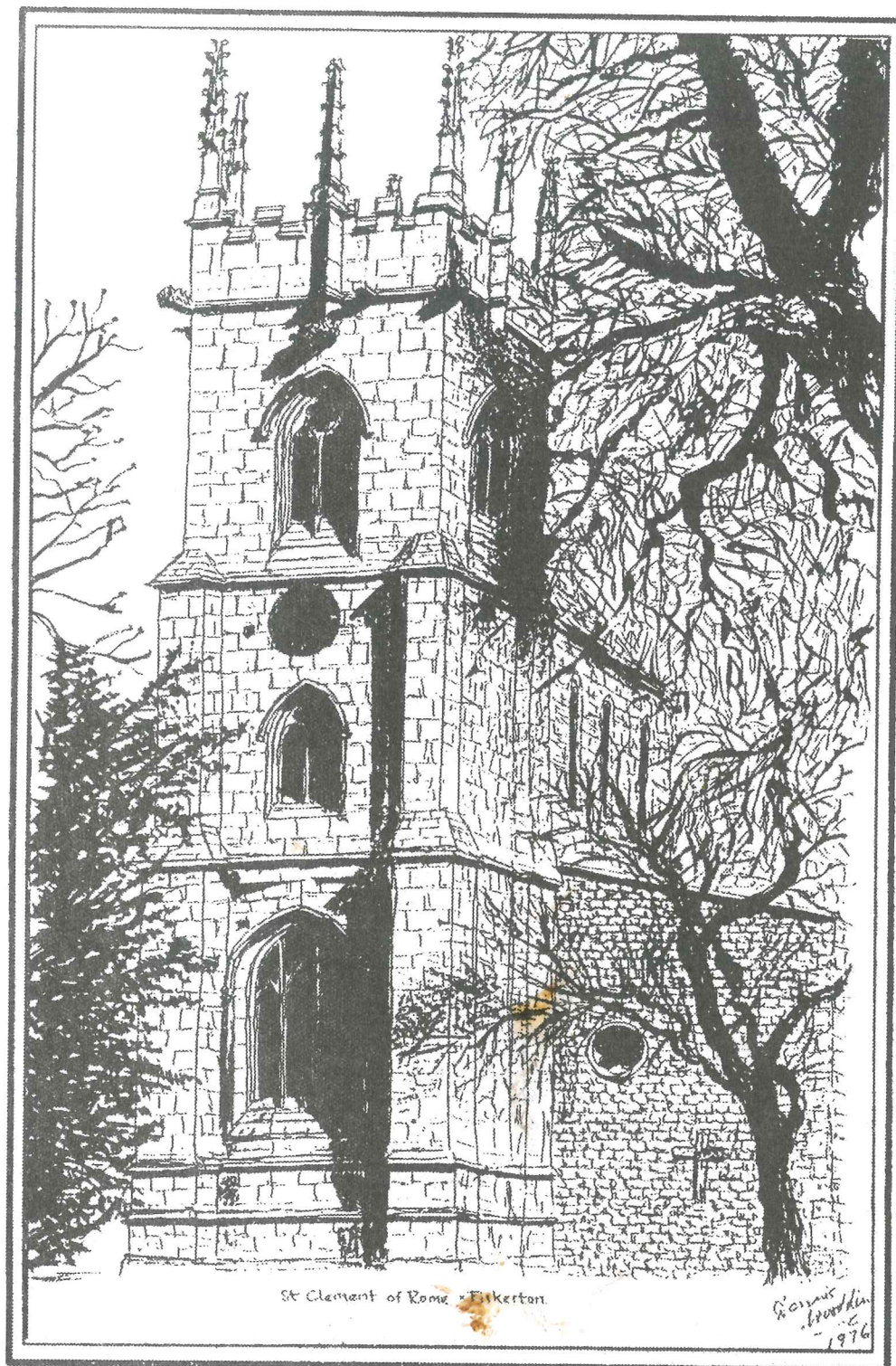

Well, first of all Happy New Year each and every one of you, doesn't time fly! It really doesn't seem a year since we were back at the beginning of 2016 does it, and what a year that turned out to be. I always find it difficult writing at this time of year, for what you read now is prepared at the beginning of December, before the peak of the Christmas season, it's the height of excitement for many, the pinnacle of stress for many others too. 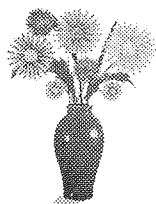

**Can you help?**

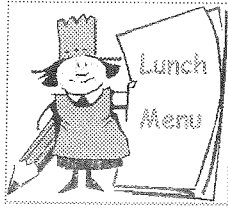
St Clement's Church is in need of a little help.

**Cafe Society on Thursday 19<sup>th</sup> January.**

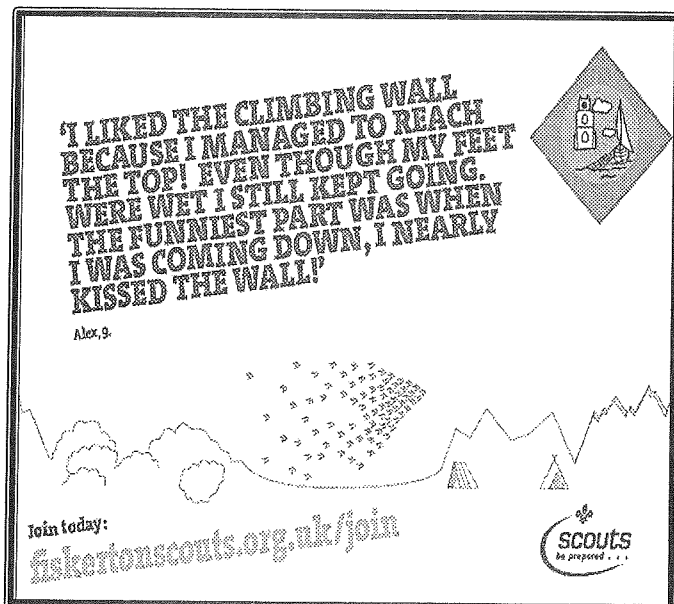
Written and directed by the legendary Woody Allen, this romantic comedy boasts an all-star cast featuring Jesse Eisenberg (The Social Network, Now You See Me), Kristen Stewart (Twilight, Snow White and the Huntsman) and Steve Carell (The Big Short, The 40-Year Old Virgin). Set in the 1930s, it sees a Bronx native move to Hollywood and fall in love with a young woman who is seeing a married man.

As usual tickets cost £3, with £1 from every ticket donated to the village hall committee or parish council for use within the venue or local community. Blueprint: Film Foundation are a non-profit organisation and all other box-office proceeds will be put towards running the project.

Food and drinks will also be available at each screening, with all proceeds going to the local village hall committee. **Doors open at 7pm.**

This project is currently funded in part by Big Lottery Fund's 'Awards for All' initiative to improve communities as well as by the British Film Institute's 'Neighbourhood Cinema' initiative and 'Film Audience Network' (through Film Hub Central East) to bring specialised film programming into areas with limited access to a cinema. The funding allows Blueprint: Film Foundation to provide screenings to village halls at no cost to the committee.

The future timeline comprises:

Assess comments from the public consultation	Jan 2017
Make any amendments to the plan	Feb 2017
Submit the final NP to WLDC	Mar 2017
WLDC undertake a final public consultation of the plan	Apr 2017
Independent examination of the plan	May 2017
Public referendum	Jul 2017
Adoption of the plan by WLDC	Aug 2017

2017 will be a very important year for the development of Fiskerton. The above plan, if adopted, will control the development for the next 20 years and the NPG have been considering the plan for the benefit of the residents and future generations. Paramount in the considerations has been the preservation of the existing services in the village and the establishment of open green spaces, managed by the community, for residents of all ages to access and use as they please. As I said in the December Newsletter every resident will get the chance to accept or reject the plan to complete this democratic process. I am sure 2017 will be a most significant year in the historic development of Fiskerton as a pleasant rural village. We can all get involved.

### Fiskerton Parish Council News

#### Happy New Year

Fiskerton Parish Council wishes everyone a happy new year and may each and every member of our community have their aspirations realised.

#### Bus Shelters

The council continues with its commitment toward the provision of bus shelters. Some of this work has been paid for out of a grant which the parish council applied for. The grant reduces the council tax burden. An order has been placed to have an additional bus shelter installed at Short Ferry.

#### Parish Precept 2017 -18

The Parish Council continues to work toward making Fiskerton a better place to live and strive to maintain and improve the area becomes increasingly difficult as costs increase and sources of income are reduced. The council recently met to consider the annual precept. That is money claimed from the district council (West Lindsey) which is charged back to residents and appears on their council tax bills. This year has seen increases in the cost of maintaining the parish office located in the village hall and a reduction in the funds provided by Lincolnshire County Council (LCC) toward grass cutting costs. On top of this for the 2017-18 year the LCC grass cutting grant is reduced to zero and West Lindsey have said the council tax support grant is to be removed. This has reduced income for next year by an estimated £4,400 and increased operating costs by £600. The Parish council has resolved to claim a precept of £22,000 for the year 2017 -18. The precept for the current year is £18,000 therefore there is a £4,000 increase. This increase equates to approximately £7 per household.

### **Parking on Pavements and Verges**

The council regularly received reports about parking on verges and vehicles blocking the path for pedestrians forcing them to walk into the road. Parking on grass verges at this time of year causes damage as verges become rutted and mud gets onto the pavements and the road. Incidents where vehicles completely block the pavement will be reported to the police who are empowered to issue fixed penalty notices for the offence. Observing a few simple rules such as, avoid parking on grass verges and pavements and park off road where possible will benefit everyone by helping to keep our village tidy and safe.

### **Litter**

The problem with litter around the village hall has been reduced by periodic litter picking. Also the quantity of litter has reduced since the teenager's shelter was removed. However there remains the odd incident where action needs to be taken. Litter picking has been an expensive job and this year the parish council is considering asking for volunteers to spend a few hours picking up and disposing of litter. If you wish to volunteer for what would be no more than a two hour session give the clerk your contact details and he will let you know when to come.

Fly posting is another activity that litters the streets. As highway authority, the county council has powers to take action against people who persistently advertise on the public highway. However some public service material may be permitted subject to licence. Again a few simple guidelines will help. If you need to put up posters, providing there is space, the parish clerk will be happy for you to use the parish notice board. The notice board is situated outside the village hall. If you take it upon yourself to post notices on lamp posts etcetera there is a risk of breaching the Highways Act. If you have to post notices will you please remove them after the event? This paper, The Fiskerton News, is as good a place as any to advertise your event.

### **Drainage**

An incident occurred near the open space at Holmfield. Apparently young people built a makeshift crossing point over a drainage ditch. The parish council was called upon and removed wood and rubble which would impede drainage. Also at this time of year ditches are likely to have slippery sides and standing water. Please advise your children to keep well away.

A manhole cover near the flood lagoon behind the village hall had to be replaced after it was smashed, allegedly by a tractor. Again parents are asked to advise their children not to play in or around the flood lagoon. There could be deep water and should a manhole cover be dislodged again a person could fall in the void.

### **Neighbourhood Plan**

Neighbourhood planning is not something unique to Fiskerton it is happening all over the country. The parish councils working group (NPG) is grant funded and good progress is being made as they are now well into the formal consultation stages. Public meetings and drop in sessions have been held as the NPG seek the views of Fiskerton people. There is much more information on the parish councils website that could be written in this column. Please take a few minutes to look over the plan.

### **Parish Council Meeting**

The next meeting of the parish council is on Monday 6<sup>th</sup> February at 7:30pm. Minutes of previous meetings are displayed on the Parish Council website.

What a difference a month makes. Last month I wrote how pleased I was with the hospital service at dealing with an emergency request for my grandson. Yesterday I was told of a completely different response by a resident who phoned 999 on behalf of his wife. The operator refused to send an ambulance. His wife was in agony with stomach pain. Fortunately, he is a car owner and drove his wife to A & E. Although the department did not appear busy, his wife was not seen immediately. When she was seen, his wife was operated on at once. His wife is still in the intensive care unit 2 or 3 days later. The resident has since been told that if he had not got his wife to hospital when he did, the outcome would have been seriously different.

It is not a happy story about the ambulance service and I'm just wondering how many other residents may have experienced similar incidents. Please let me know.

On Monday 21<sup>st</sup> November, during Open Forum 2 those at the meeting were told by representatives of the Neighbourhood Plan Group that new development in Fiskerton could equally well be to the west of the village, as to the east. Those who have been campaigning to keep extra cars out of the centre of the village or who have been worried about extra flooding in Ferry Road were relieved to hear the news. It will be interesting to see the results of the consultation when they are presented to the village in January before finally being forwarded to West Lindsey as promised at the meeting.

I had a late night the night Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> December. I was at the count for the election for a Sleaford MP and as you will know the Conservatives won by a landslide. I had previously delivered dozens of leaflets for Councillor Marianne Overton. Marianne got over 2800 votes, a few hundred less than Labour, who in turn got a few less than the Liberals who in turn got a few less than UKIP. I came home with a feeling that unless you have an issue such as the closing of a local hospital independent candidates have very little chance of being elected.

According to residents I met, they were bombarded with flyers, newspapers and telephone calls. I met numerous leaflet deliverers from across the country and newspapers and the television have been full of coverage of the main parties. Forgetting Brexit, the talking points I heard were, hospitals, doctor shortage, immigration, roads and potholes, cuts, and poor police coverage. I came away wondering the reasons for such a landslide victory.

Last but not least, one new Fiskerton resident, suggested I visited the ShortFerry Christmas Fayre. I am glad I did. I came away with several paintings, a magnificent fruitcake and lots of nik-naks. It is amazing what you can learn from someone who has only been in the village five minutes.

**Winter motoring** requires special care and a little preparation if you are to avoid a breakdown or accident. This guide is intended to help you with your journeys in adverse weather, especially as it gets worse over winter. If you must drive in snowy conditions, make sure your vehicle is well prepared and that you know how to handle your vehicle in dangerous road conditions.

Consult the manufacturer's manual for tips specific to driving your vehicle in slippery conditions. Modern vehicles are fitted with various safety systems which are there to aid you. These systems may be labelled as ABS (antilock braking system), TSC (traction control system), ESC/P (electronic stability control system/programme). There are often labelled buttons on the vehicle's dashboard and linked into warning lights which illuminate when they are operating. Read the vehicle manual and understand what these systems can do for you and how they operate.

**Before you set out** always check your route making sure you listen for realtime weather warnings and traffic information and are prepared to change or delay your journey dependant on advice being given and let somebody know where you are going and the route you are intending to take.

**Before Setting Off** turn on your lights to increase your visibility to other motorists and keep your lights and windscreen clean. Clear all your windows and lights of any snow, ice or frost. Clear any snow off the bonnet and roof of the vehicle before you drive off. It can blow on to or slip down over the windscreen and obscure your view or blow onto the vehicle behind you.

It will provide a view of selected information about you that is contained in existing electronic record systems across the county. This will include:

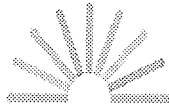
- lab tests

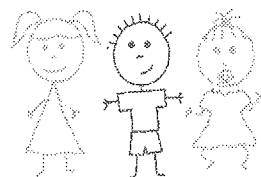
