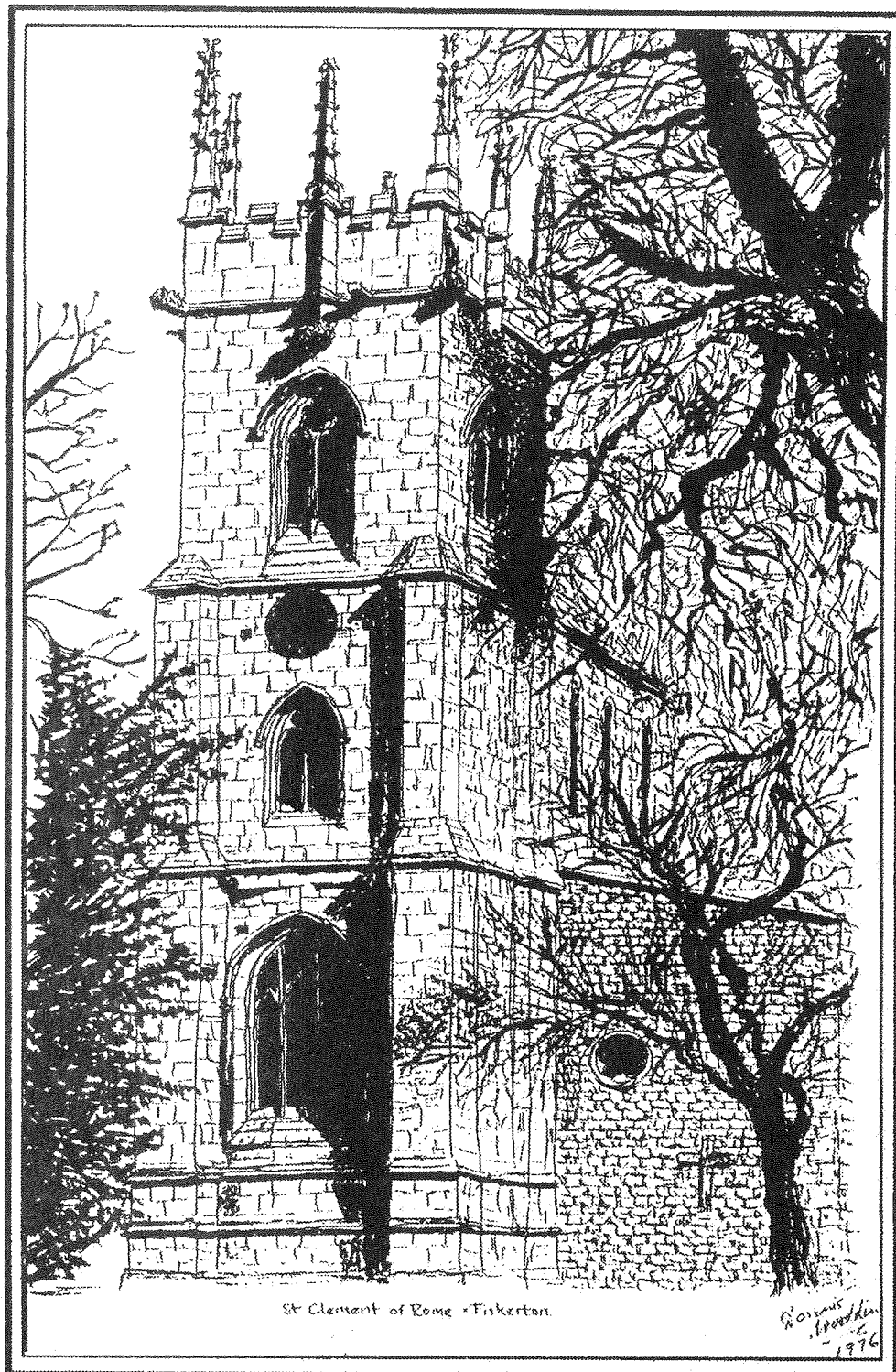
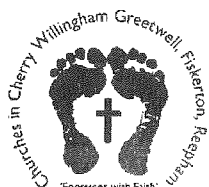

Vicar's Blog:



Generosity!

November and December were quite overwhelming months for me in many ways. Firstly because over the course of those two months the pace of life seems to get faster and faster as we run headlong towards Christmas – busy, rewarding and very fulfilling. Mostly though, overwhelming because of the generosity of many people who seemed to catch the vision of Christmas Day Lunch in the Church Hall. Vicars get 'good' ideas sometimes, but often don't have the wherewithal to carry out the idea. My last Church did Christmas Day lunch in a way that I assumed would work here, but instead over November and December I was caught in an overwhelming flow of generosity as people offered time, skills, money, gifts, cards, energy, transport, food, decorations, drink to ensure that 30 of us had a lovely time together; folk who would have been on their own didn't want to be, folk who needed a different way of doing Christmas, one or two who needed somewhere to go at the last minute. All in all it was a particularly successful venture, made so by the generosity of many.

Christmas is very much about generosity. I write this as we begin the season of Epiphany when we celebrate the giving of gifts to the Christ-child by the wise men. Those gifts were each of significance, however, what was also of significance was the time and energy and courage expended by the wise men to find the Christ-child in order to give their gifts – they were gifts both of generosity and of sacrifice – they meant something. At its heart Christmas is about the giving of a generous God, a God who gave a Son that we might discover the lavish, abundant love within which we are held by Him. Generosity has God's fingerprint on it – it reflects His image.

Will we do Christmas Day lunch again it again? In some ways that depends not on me, but on those who so generously gave up their time, this year, or others who may wish to. I was particularly indebted to Margaret and Meg who did the shopping/preparation and cooking, and also the Team of Seven who gave up their Christmas Day. Thank you folks – you did a great job!

Fiskerton Parish Council News

One of my duties as parish clerk is to receive correspondence and e-mails from residents and associate authorities. Most are dealt with routinely but recently there have been a few enquiries that seemed to indicate a general lack of understanding about what parish councils actually do. So I thought perhaps a few lines in the parish newsletter may improve understanding and perhaps may even motivate some people into helping or joining the parish council. It's all voluntary work of course but as my old boss used to say "it's a unique career development opportunity". Young people over the age of eighteen years could gain experience of meetings and managing, a great addition to any CV, and the not so young who already have experience may also be an asset to the community.

About Parish Councils

A parish council is sometimes called a local council as such they are the lowest tier of democratically elected local government representatives. They consist of a chairman and councillors who act as a focus for local opinion. They have discretionary powers to represent and serve their community by providing local services.

Parish councils have the power to precept their residents to support their services and projects. Services vary according to the needs of an area. Generally there are things a council must do because the law requires it and they may do what is lawfully permissible.

Councils should:

- Comply with rules set out in law to guide their procedures. A council may add its own regulations. Together they make up the councils standing orders.
- Hold a minimum of four meetings a year, one shall be the Annual Meeting of the Council
- Elect a chairman annually
- Appoint a responsible financial officer
- Publish accounts
- Appoint an internal auditor
- Appoint officers appropriate for carrying out its functions
- Have health, safety and risk management policies
- Comply with: The Freedom of Information Act 2000, Data Protection Act 1998 and the Equality Act 2010

Local councils have functions as vested in the Local Government Act 1972.

The Localism Act 2011 gives eligible councils the power to do anything an individual may do providing it is lawful. However the exercise of powers is not a duty. For example; a parish council is empowered to provide bus shelters but is not duty bound to provide them.

Fiskerton Parish Council has regular meetings and the proceedings of the meetings are recorded in the meeting minutes. Minutes of previous meetings are available on the council's website.

Fiskerton Parish Council Community Links

Parish councils have limited powers but they play a vital part in representing the local community. Much of the strategic work is undertaken by higher level authorities. Fiskerton parish council does not mend the roads. That is done by Lincolnshire County Council (LCC) which is the Highway Authority. The parish council will report pot holes and other highway defects to LCC.

Parish councils do not decide on planning issues. That is done by West Lindsey District Council (WLDC) which is the Planning Authority. Fiskerton Parish Council is invited by WLDC to comment on planning applications. Although comments from an individual has equal standing, parish councillors are likely to have a better understanding of local development plans and what may or may not be valid reasons to object or support an application.

Occasionally a police officer will attend a parish council meeting which gives councillors an opportunity to comment on road traffic and other local crime related issues. Speeding and parking are regularly mooted.

To a certain extent the higher level authorities place some reliance on parish councils to provide the conduit to feedback public opinion from the grass roots of communities. They use this information to adjust their service levels according to the needs of the communities they serve.

Fiskerton Parish Council Services

The direct services provided by the parish council vary from time to time depending on needs of the community and whether finance is available. Services include;

- Provision of allotments
- Grass cutting in the amenity areas, cemetery and green spaces
- Maintenance of the church clock
- Comment on planning applications
- Resourcing of the Neighbourhood plan
- Maintenance of flood alleviation schemes
- Bus shelter provision and maintenance
- Children's play area
- Traffic calming speed indicator signs
- Fiskerton parish website
- Litter picking
- Support for community projects, charities
- Village Hall grounds maintenance

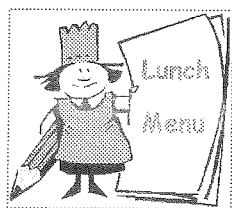
FISKERTON NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN GROUP

The NPD is progressing along the schedule outlined in the last Newsletter. In January we assessed the comments made by residents and professional consultees, received during the consultation period ending on December 20th. Thank you for taking part and the large number of comments you made. As has been stated before and was made clear at the November 21st Open Forum Meeting, the consultation responses and comments made were to be included in the decision making process. The NPG considered all the comments and the evidence that supported them. Of the 159 responses 21 were sent to an unofficial collection site and passed on to the NPG before December 20th. At first the WLDC Monitoring Officer advised the NPG to ignore these responses and later said that the NPG could decide whether to accept them or not. The NPG decided to accept all the responses received before 5.00 pm on December 20th. This was to be able to get as full a view as possible of the residents' wishes and to reduce conflict between residents. The results of the consultation will be released after further analysis and consideration by the NPG and to coincide with the publication of the Fiskerton Consultation Statement (which is a booklet collating all the responses) and an update of the Neighbourhood Plan. All this information will be made available on the website.

After the official referendum, which will take place in July, we need to come together as a united village whatever the result.

FISKERTON GARDENING CLUB

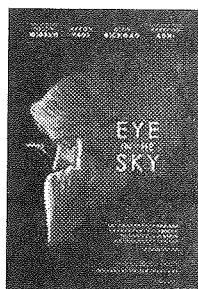
MONDAY 13TH FEBRUARY AT 7:30 PM IN THE VILLAGE HALL

Just for a change, I thought you might like to hear some news from Cherry Willingham. The Parish Council meeting, Monday 16th January was most interesting.

First, the marina plans are being re-assessed and a presentation was given in the village hall on Tuesday 17th January.

Second, last year, the Parish Council bought land south of Fiskerton Rd to give residents access to the river bank. The project is well underway and the councillors deserve a pat on the back for their imagination, hard work and perseverance. I was most impressed.

Third, it was announced that the estimates for the bypass are coming in under budget. Just a couple of percentage points on a £100,000,000 project adds up to several million £s. More than enough to build a proper bridge over Hawthorn Rd, several times over! Is there sufficient interest in this village to try to get a proper bridge reinstated? Seeing that the County Council owns the land, has the plans, the money and is the Planning Authority, it should be achievable and still meet existing completion dates- if there is a will to do so! Please contact me.

Fourth, the Cherry Willingham Neighbourhood Plan. It is rolling forward and the Neighbourhood Plan Group are determined to get the plan and process right. It seems they are currently undertaking a "Neighbourhood Plan Health Check" with an independent expert. This is not unusual, and other parishes have done the same and found the exercise worthwhile.

Which brings me on to the Fiskerton Neighbour Hood Plan. What a year of changes this has been!

If you attended the meetings in May, July and November you might also think a Neighbourhood Health Check would be worthwhile here too.

The information that The Paddock, The Crescent and Plough Lane had been included as Local Green Spaces in the Local Plan Draft Copy April 2016 came as great news. I am delighted that Plough Lane has been included, both for the residents living in the road and for protecting that particular view of the village. However, it does suggest to me one more argument for building to the west of the village. Neither Plough Lane nor the High Street are ideal through routes now. With the listed buildings in both, both will be difficult to widen or straighten.

So it is hardly surprising that most people I speak to give me the impression that that they would prefer developing to the west of the village, just to keep cars out of the village and away from Plough Lane and the High Street and to avoid increasing the flood risk along Ferry Rd between Corn Close and Hall Lane.

The County Council have told me that they would like to see Traffic Assessments for all the options and I think such assessments would be most helpful for the residents before the final plan is presented to West Lindsey and the Inspector.

Just so you know, the following is an extract from a Government web site in 2012.

Neighbourhood Plan Definition.

Neighbourhood planning is a new way for communities to decide the future of the places where they live and work. They will be able to:

- *choose where they want new homes, shops and offices to be built*
- *have their say on what those new buildings should look like and what infrastructure should be provided*
- *grant planning permission for the new buildings they want to see go ahead...*

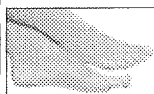

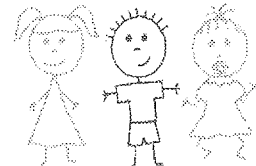

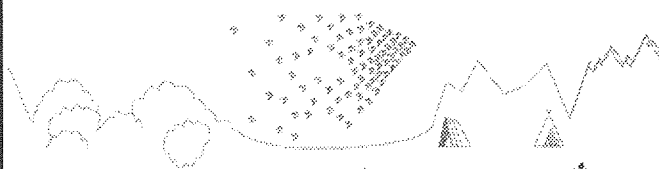
