

Vicars Blog: 'Thy Kingdom Come'



I guess that a lot of us know the words to the Lord's Prayer. It's called the 'Lord's Prayer' because it is the prayer that Jesus taught His followers to pray when they asked Him 'how' to pray. Many of us learned it at school and it is prayed by over two billion Christians all over the world – that often makes me think that when I am not praying it, someone else is, which means that the voice of someone praying echoes around the world 24 hours per day.

Last year during the period between our celebration of the Ascension of Jesus and Pentecost, we spent nine days praying in a more concerted way as we walked through, to and around our villages and in our churches. It was a national initiative encouraged by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York. Personally, for me it was a really moving experience as I walked with friends, having experienced the death of my mother a day before we started. Honestly, I couldn't think of a better way to honour her. This year though the initiative is expanding - the call to prayer is global and ecumenical in an initiative called 'Thy Kingdom Come'. In light of that we will be walking and praying from Church to Church in our Deanery – from Glentham to Burton and from Greetwell to Scampton.....

But why pray, and why pray 'thy Kingdom Come?'

Christians believe in the power of prayer to transform lives. Many of us know that others have prayed for us and that it has changed our lives. Many of us have experienced the stillness and strength that can come from listening to God and being in His presence. So, we are praying that others may come to know that same transforming presence of Jesus Christ in their lives; and in praying for God's Kingdom to come we are praying that the love of Jesus will flow through and flood our communities.

If you are a praying person, come and join in, enjoy company on the roads we travel and experience Jesus in a new way. If you would like us to pray for you, then during May there will be prayer boxes in our churches where you can slip a request into the box.

FISKERTON NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN GROUP STATEMENT ON CHOICE OF SITE

The Draft Neighbourhood Plan that was presented for public consultation during November and December 2016 contained two possible sites for the development of approximately 200 homes. This was as a result of requests from village residents after the Church Commissioners informed WLDC that the site to the West was now available (Sept 2016). The proposed sites were North of Ferry Road or West of the village as illustrated on pages 20 and 25 of the Draft Neighbourhood Plan.

159 responses were received, 6 from professional statutory consultees and 153 from residents. When commenting on the preferred site, 3 of the professional consultees favoured the site North of Ferry Road and 3 were neutral. The residents responses were all considered carefully and each comment was given a score: 1, 2, or 3 where 1 had a negative effect on the future village, 2 neutral and 3 a positive effect. The North of Ferry Road site received the highest score indicating that it is the preferred site according to the village residents' responses. The evidence is available on the website.

There will be a referendum on the Plan in July 2017.

During the NPG meeting on 18th January 2017 the following points were made in favour of the North of Ferry Road site.


- 1. It "rounds off" the village. Not adding to the already East-West extended village.
- 2. It is close to the school and shop, allowing easy safe access by foot.
- 3. It avoids disturbing areas of known archaeological interest in the West site. A point also made by LCC.
- 4. Access to the site via Corn Close and Hall Lane is available but will need to be improved.
- 5. The West site cuts into the "Green Corridor" suggested in earlier drafts of the plan to prevent development encroaching in the direction of Cherry Willingham and Reepham
- 6. The Sustainability Appraisal and the Site Selection documents favoured the North of Ferry Road site. A point also made by WLDC.
- 7. Many of the residents in favour of the site to the West referred to the traffic problems, flooding risk and sewage problems being greatest with the site North of Ferry Road but Lincolnshire County Council, Anglian Water and the Environment Agency assessed these two sites equally for these potential problems.
- 8. As the site North of Ferry Road had been discussed with the Church Commissioners and WLDC for over two years, negotiations had taken place for the Parish Council to acquire the Manor farm Paddock for recreational use as part of the planning gain. Equivalent negotiations had not taken place for any other site.

Many of you will know that a petition was sent to WLDC asking them to hold an extraordinary meeting to debate the Fiskerton Neighbourhood Plan. This petition has been passed to the Fiskerton Parish Council and by the time you read this the PC will have considered the content of the petition and responded to it. Please visit the village web site where you will see the plan and the documents providing supporting evidence.

Flix in The Stix Screenings at Fiskerton in April

Fiskerton Village Hall committee continue to host 'Flix in the Stix', run by Lincolnshire-based non-profit organisation Blueprint: Film Foundation. The service provides monthly cinema screenings to seven rural locations across Lincolnshire.

April sees Flix in the Stix offer up some thought provoking independent films and the village hall committee chose to screen

'He Named Me Malala' on Thursday 20th April, 7.30pm.

He Named Me Malala is an intimate documentary about Nobel Peace Prize Laureate Malala Yousafzai, who was targeted by the Taliban and severely

wounded by a gunshot when returning home on her school bus in Pakistan's Swat Valley. The then 15-year-old was singled out, along with her father, for advocating for girls' education, and the attack on her sparked an outcry from supporters around the world. She miraculously survived and is now a leading campaigner for girls' education globally as co-founder of the Malala Fund.

As usual tickets cost £3, with £1 from every ticket donated to the village hall committee or parish council for use within the venue or local community. Blueprint: Film Foundation are a non-profit organisation and all other box-office proceeds will be put towards running the project. Food and drinks will also be available at each screening, with all proceeds going to the local village hall committee. **Doors open at 7pm**.

This project is currently funded in part by Big Lottery Fund's 'Awards for All' initiative to improve communities as well as by the British Film Institute's 'Neighbourhood Cinema' initiative and 'Film Audience Network' (through Film Hub Central East) to bring specialised film programming into areas with limited access to a cinema. The funding allows Blueprint: Film Foundation to provide screenings to village halls at no cost to the committee.



So what's new? Isn't great, Spring is here, the daffodils are out and British Summertime will be here next week!

Perhaps we could have a plant daffodils week in the autumn to add even more colour for next year.

Since last month a number of residents collected **430 signatures** for a petition requesting West Lindsey District Council make sure there is a full and open debate on all the various options for growth in the village before the Neighbourhood Plan proceeds to the Inspector. The District Council refused to accept the petition and I, and others, have lodged a formal complaint about the Council's action. Living on the Holmfield Estate whatever happens will hardly affect me, apart from the extra traffic on Chapel Rd. However, I do believe the process needs to be "right" and the residents have a fair chance to judge all the options and assess the latest comments from the Church Commissioners before decisions are made.

Now for something completely different! Some time ago I "lost" my mobile phone in the village. It was a 7" Lenovo tablet. If anyone knows where it is I am offering a £100 reward for its recovery. But why am I telling you?

When I lost my phone, it was impossible to report the loss. The Police did not want to know. They do not have the manpower to deal with mobile phones, loss or theft. The hospital has similar manpower problems and I am increasingly frustrated over potholes, street lighting and Hawthorn Rd. and my council tax has gone up.

All these frustrations are linked by one word BUDGETS. I was delighted when Tony Blair first introduced two new B words into Government Speak, Budgets and Bench Marking. Unfortunately he forgot to include Bottlenecks. If the three Bs had been applied intelligently to our public services they could have worked wonders by now.

Just imagine you owned an ocean liner, and the ship's engineer went to the captain and said, "the boat has sprung a leak, and I do not have the budget to fix it". This is what is happening in hospitals, highways, schools, the police and other public services. A small easing of a budget in one department could eliminate a Bottleneck or leak and save the organisation a fortune. Those running budgets in the public services would seem to prefer losing £Billions than take small corrective local decisions that might make the organisation as a whole run more efficiently. A few extra policemen in Lincoln should help reduce crime and might have saved me £100 of my personal Law and Order Budget.

A few extra recovery beds possibly "out of hospital" could reduce bed blocking and give the patient a quicker and better chance of recovery than keeping the same patient in hospital unnecessarily. It could also give me, the tax payer, a substantially better service. Everybody knows this, Why isn't it done?

One of the possible knock on effects of bed blocking is ambulance delays and hold ups in A&E. Here again a small investment in A&E could pay for itself several times over in in benefits to departments further up and down the line.

Healthcare, doctors surgeries, ambulance and hospital costs need to come under the same umbrella and the top manager given the brief: Make it run better or look for another job.

One solution I have heard is to stop patients with minor wounds or problems visiting A&E. It is not my answer. If all health services were the responsibility of the same manager paying a nurse to treat minor ailments will be similar if they are in the hospital or in a doctor's surgery. The manager for the combined service would soon spot the bottlenecks and invest his staff and cash where needed. Just to protect his bonus.

Running the Government is very different from running a business. In business you can only spend money once. With the Government the money keeps going round and round and each time it changes hands the Government gets a cut. The faster it circulates the faster the economy grows. So why is the country so broke now?

Money that is taken out of the country is a write off. When the Banks went bust, £Billions went abroad and left us all in debt. I will never earn enough in my life to pay off my share. But for my grandchildren's' sake I do think a more joined up approach to management in local government would be beneficial and that a number of existing expensive contracts for outside services and Public Finance Initiatives need terminating. I would be delighted to hear your comments.

There will be a full trail of 35 knights around the city and an education trail, consisting of half size Knights, on display in iconic buildings around the city.

The Knights Trail is raising money for the Nomad Trust, an important local charity we support every year. The CWCS Knight has been named Rufus the Rider by Connor Doughty and Henry Linley, and the name Zeus was nominated by Hollie Tapper and given to his horse.

Why commemorate 2017?

The signing the Magna Carta in 1215 did not stop fighting between King John and the barons; and by 1217 the war had reached the gates of Lincoln Castle where the rebel army took on a Lincolnshire grandmother, Nicola De La Haye. The outcome of the Battle of Lincoln, 1217, was pivotal for British history, keeping a French prince off the English throne and leading to the Magna Carta being reissued along with an additional new agreement, the Charter of the Forest. This gave ordinary people new rights to live and work on land which covered more than a third of England. Both of these documents can still be viewed at Lincoln Castle.

We have many plans here in school for Rufus the Rider, and his trusty steed Zeus, involving numerous cross curricular projects for all students to get involved in. We also plan to invite our local primary school students to get involved too. Our theme for the design of our knight is 'Alice in Wonderland' which was launch on World Book Day on 2nd March. All students were bought their own copy of the book to read throughout the length of the project and many staff and students dressed up as Alice characters to mark the occasion. 
