

Vicar's Blog:

As you read this, the church will be in the season of Lent, a time of preparation for Easter, a time when we remember Jesus entering into the wilderness to prepare for his sharing of himself and his teaching of others. It might be known as the season of austerity! Traditionally, the flowers are taken out of our churches, the colour purple appears, people often give up things they like eating or doing and it can be seen as a time of being thoroughly miserable!! STOP THERE!

What is Lent really about? It is not about being thoroughly miserable! It is about redressing the balance and fixing our eyes on a Jesus we love, (it didn't escape my notice that this year Lent starts on Valentine's Day!) taking some time to turn down the volume of our lives and to focus. So often Lent has become a time when instead of focussing on God we spend our lives thinking about the sacrifice we have made so the focus turns back on us, but actually the point is that the focus is on God and our relationship with him. This year in Lent I have suggested to folk that we turn to prayer. That we consciously spend some time everyday in one of our churches praying together and beginning that with 15 minutes of silence, so that we learn to be silent everyday for a short while. That will take some discipline and some commitment, but I am convinced that during this time we will discover new things about God and about ourselves.

Or if you would like to join in with the Church of England reflections for Lent #livelent 'Let Your Light Shine' then go to the website www.cofe.anglican.org and sign up.

If you need some time of silence on your own, Reepham Church and Cherry Willingham churches are open every day and Evening Prayer is held every week 4.45pm at Fiskerton - you will find some prayer resources in these churches if you need them.

"Fiskerton resident, Stuart Molkenthin, to run the London Marathon.



Dear Fiskerton Residents,

I am too am a resident of Fiskerton, and I will be running the London Marathon this April for charity. Fiskerton CE Primary School, where my two boys attend, have decided to support me and my chosen charity - Action Duchenne.

A year ago, my dear friends Lizzie and James, received the devastating news that their 3 year old son, Sebastian, has the rare and life-limiting disease, Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy (DMD), for which there is currently no cure.

Exciting research is taking place into this disease, but because it is so rare, funding to help children like Sebastian is limited. No-one should ever have to receive this kind of life changing news about their child, and so I decided to start fundraising in support of Sebastian, his family, and Action Duchenne.

On 2 Apr 17, I completed the City of Lincoln 10k run, and on 10 Sep 17, I tackled the Great North Run half marathon, as a member of Team Action Duchenne. My next challenge is the London Marathon 2018, where I will be running with a small team of Action Duchenne runners. This will be my first and only marathon, so I must make it count.

Supporting residents of Fiskerton by helping them to be heard

Last month we posted our first notice in the newsletter and I am delighted to report the fantastic response we received, it really does reinforce just how many of the village residents have concerns over the Draft Neighbourhood Plan(NP) and from the correspondence we received it is clear that this is a subject that stirs up a lot of emotion. We had intended for it to be a one off post to explain who the Open Forum are and emphasise that we are not linked to the Parish Council (PC) or the Neighbourhood Planning Group (NPG) but due to so many of you showing an interest we now aim to deliver a brief update in every month. National policy defines the core planning principles that should be complied with when creating a NP and they say things like "empowering local people to shape their surroundings", "setting out a positive vision for the future of the area", "Neighbourhood planning gives communities direct power to develop a shared vision for their neighbourhood" and "Neighbourhood planning provides a powerful set of tools for local people". The emphasis is on local people creating a local plan that meets local needs, the Parish Council are just the official body to oversee and coordinate the plan. If you don't agree with the NP or you feel it should be changed in any way then you have to make your views known.

This is your plan and it will affect everyone in the village. You must help to shape the future of the village. Every Voice counts. Together we can make a difference.

Cllr. Ian Fleetwood's brief: The latest on, what's happening in the public sector in Lincolnshire.

LCC's Chief Executive Tony McArdle to step down: Lincolnshire County Council's Chief Executive, Tony McArdle, will be stepping down after over twelve years in the role. He will hand over his formal Chief Executive responsibilities following February's council meeting, but will continue work on some key projects whilst a new Chief Executive is appointed, until departing in the summer.

Consultation on Fairer Funding: The government has launched a technical consultation into the key cost drivers for local authorities in providing services. This will help create a new system of funding for councils. A full response will be put together from the county council before the deadline in March. The opportunity for Lincolnshire to get fairer funding which we currently miss out on.

"If councils here received the average funding for council areas in England, the region would benefit from £116 million of extra funding for services every year – some of which could be used towards highways repairs. That would make a massive difference."

Council nets extra £1.7m to tackle an estimated 30,000 potholes: The Government has given the county council a further £1,736,514 from its 2017/18 Pothole Action Fund. "We spend around £50m on highways maintenance each year. While this sounds like a lot of money, we have 5,500 miles of road to maintain and that funding will only go so far. We're repairing thousands of potholes every month, with over 4,000 dealt with in December alone. That's why we're calling on the Government for fairer funding for Lincolnshire. Council looking into all options following Carillion liquidation: County council officials are determining the best way forward following the announcement that its primary Lincoln Eastern Bypass contractor, Carillion, has gone into liquidation following struggles with debts of £900m.

Lincolnshire supports its Young Carers: Lincolnshire County Council is supporting Young Carers Awareness Day to ensure young people who are caring for a loved one get the help they need. Almost 1500 young people under the age of 19 who have a caring role within the family home are supported by the county council, however, it is estimated there are many more young people who do not identify themselves as Carers and are missing out on support.

What Now! Young People's e-newsletter: What Now! is the Youth Hub's monthly e-newsletter filled with information about exciting opportunities and activities for young people aged eight -18. If you work with children, young people and families in this age range please share this and encourage them to subscribe to receive this newsletter.

Consultation on new Special Educational Needs: LCC's Children's Services has been working with all special school head teachers, chairs of governors of special schools and the Lincolnshire Parent Carer Forum to develop a new model for special education. All interested parties are being urged to comment through a survey on the council's website at www.lincolnshire.gov.uk/SENDcommunities or people can email their comments or enquiries at SENDCommunities@lincolnshire.gov.uk.

Firefighters launch Safe and Well checks in Lincolnshire: Vulnerable residents in Lincolnshire are set to benefit from Safe and Well checks by Lincolnshire firefighters. Safe and Well Checks will still incorporate fire safety, but will now include advice to help an individual improve their health and wellbeing, with the ultimate goal to help people to stay safe in their own homes

Lincolnshire Care Awards: Now in its second year, the Lincolnshire Care Awards is again celebrating outstanding care workers, teams and organisations in a ceremony organised by Lincolnshire Care Association (LinCA). For more information visit the <u>Lincolnshire Care Association website</u> or follow the hashtag #LincsCareAwards on Twitter and Facebook.

Empowering self-care: LCC is developing a Library of Information and Services to provide online information and a searchable directory to support residents, service users, their families and carers.

NHS Consultation: NHS Clinical Commissioners (NHSCC) and NHS England have launched a public consultation on reducing prescribing of over-the-counter medicines for 33 minor, short-term health concerns. In the year prior to June 2017, the NHS spent approximately £569 million on prescriptions for medicines which can be purchased over the counter from a pharmacy and other outlets such as supermarkets.

Exhibition of works by Britain's most famous sculptor comes to Lincoln: An exciting new exhibition is bringing work by Henry Moore to Lincoln, displaying rarely seen pieces and presenting a new side to the artist. PLEASE NOTE: The opinions expressed in the following piece are the personal views of Councillor Darcel and do not necessarily represent the views of other local officers and organisations.

As one of your 3 district councillors the main issues that come to me are highways and planning. Highways are not in my province and fall under the jurisdiction of the County Council but I will continue to forward your comments on to those at the top of the LCC tree.

However, the District Council is very much involved with local planning issues and spending your money. Sometimes I just cannot make head or tail of either.

Two examples would be the refusal of planning permission at Tanya and why are large amounts of money being spent on the Gainsborough and Market Rasen and why nothing comes back to Fiskerton.

These are not really issues for the Parish News and I wonder if you might appreciate my booking the village hall to explore WLDC policies: to listen to your views and to find out just what you would like to see in the way of infrastructure and how you would like to see the village grow in the future.

Before the NPG puts any plan to the Inspector, or to find out about other services offered by WLDC. Please let me know.

Buses and Trains.

Public transport is an important key to a pleasant life-style and an essential means of getting to school, the doctor, shops, hospital and friends for many residents .

I would like to see more buses and new routes, better footpaths and cycle-ways and more reliable journeys.

And I am not convinced that the "no money" argument has been properly thought through.

Over recent months I've had perhaps 10% of my short intercity train journeys suffer delays or cancellations and Sunday trips back from London have proved a nightmare. I know residents in this village have had similar problems with the buses. Sometimes these problems are caused by mechanical breakdown, sometimes by road or rail work and frequently by insufficient staff. Sounds familiar? I believe A&E at the hospital and education, schools and the police have the same problems.

Insufficient resources have been allocated to handle surges in demand.

I believe the financial logic is false and this is where I feel Local and National Government falls down. "Management" seems to budget for a minimum level of plant and staff to cover the average workload. The end results are much higher costs to rectify damage done or business lost through insufficient capacity.

However, the electrification of all rail lines in 20 years was great news. The trains should be faster, smoother, more comfortable and more reliable NOW - but on reflection this is just scratching the surface.

If manpower and resourcing are only provided for average traffic or 100% staff attendance we will have nicer, newer trains that can and will be cancelled at a moment's notice.

Unless of course we go Autonomous. Autonomous (driverless) electric powered boats, buses, helicopters, taxis, and cars are either on the streets now or at advanced stages of design. They will completely change the way we travel and move about. Our roads will need streamlining to facilitate the new vehicles and electric trains and trams could be autonomous now, but this will lead to other serious necessary discussions and debate.

Fiskerton Annual Parish Meeting

Monday 5th March 2018 – Fiskerton Village Hall 18:45 hrs

Followed by an Ordinary meeting of the parish council at 19:30 hrs

Background

Throughout England there are many local councils representing local people by managing local issues on behalf of the community. They meet regularly to make decisions on behalf of the community.

There are four types of meeting:

- 1. Ordinary Meeting of the Parish council where elected councillors make decisions.
- 2. **Extraordinary Meetings** are held when there are confidential issues such as personnel matters which need to be discussed in private. These can include: staff interviews or the co-opting of a councillor. It is not fair to have peoples personal details discussed in a public forum.
- 3. **The Annual Meeting of the Parish Council** during which officers of the council are elected. They are the chairman, vice chairman and the lead roles such as chairman of the planning committee for example.
- 4. **The Annual Parish Meeting.** By law this meeting has to be held between 1st of March and 1st June every year. All electors are entitled to attend this meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting is when the parish council invite the public and press to the meeting to hear reports from the chairman, district or county councillors, the local school, the neighbourhood watch of any other organisation.

It is also an opportunity for electors within the parish to express their opinions on what the parish council are doing and to make suggestions about future service delivery. During the annual Meeting standing orders are suspended. Issues raised may be put to the vote but this vote is not binding on the parish council.
