

#### Vicar's Blog July 2020

A wet rainy day in June – that's when I am writing this – in stark contrast to the beautiful weather we have had in May and in the days before this one. We need rain, we need sunshine – life is full of contrasts – we only have to look at the last few weeks! For some people the last few weeks have been characterised by long hours, intense working environments, thinking through new ways of working; for others it has been a time of waiting, a time of having to receive help rather than give it; for some its been full of sadness and trauma, others have enjoyed more time with the family. I will reflect on this as a time when we learned the names of more of our neighbours. When we saw kindness offered. The Helpline that we set up in March is still working and we have now done 350 prescription drops/shopping/dog walking and helped with some other more random requests. I hope this continue – that when we get back to work and play and everything else, we are not distracted from the things that we have discovered are really important – particularly being kind to one another. I also want to say thankyou to everyone at Fiskerton School who, since March, have given so much time and energy to our children. They have adapted amazingly, have looked out for other people and have been amazing. Thankyou Mrs Rycroft and to the staff who have gone more than the extra mile.

..... and so it continues .... things are beginning to return to us .... More contact with people, and at last we can begin to open church for private prayer and funerals to a limited extent ie social distancing means that the capacity of our churches is reduced massively. Of course, writing this risks the fact that by the time Fiskerton News pops through your letterbox, all will have changed again!

There have been other things too haven't there apart from a worldwide pandemic. Other disturbing things. Racism. Shocking scenes of violence. Things have come to the fore that we get distracted from in the normal course of life because we move on so quickly – this time we can't be distracted from the hate and the hurt experienced by Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic communities across the world and in our own country, and our own city and communities; the pandemic has highlighted issues of race and justice and we must be a part of addressing them and making change. We have to come together on this .... And we have shown we can do that... Marcus Rashford showed we can do it. Many of us have been supporting the FiSH (Food in School Holidays Project) for some years now because we have recognised the need and tried to help in a small way. Marcus Rashford spoke up with an authentic voice and people listened, and right was on his side. Well done that man!






Fiskerton Church of England Primary School, Ferry Road, Lincoln, LN3 4HU

#### Councillor Chris Darcel writes.....

It is no secret, my memory is not as good as it used to be and sometimes I find it lets me down in an embarrassing fashion. And when it does, the best I can do is say sorry. However, just to show I am not alone, here is a little memory test for you. Can anyone tell me a) what year the picture on the right was taken and b) when the neighbourhood plan was started? There are no prizes but the photograph of "Fiskerton in Flood" was taken in October, 1993 and the Neighbourhood Plan was started in June 2014.



Possible future flooding in the village is a worry to me and once Covid has been sorted I would like to put a couple of ideas I have on drainage to residents. If approved I will then present them to the District Council, LCC, WIDB and the Environment Agency. Regards the neighbourhood plan, shortly after you get this newsletter, a resume of the results of the questionnaire should be pushed through your letter box. However there is a new fox in the hen coop. It is the proposed extension of the existing and proposed solar panels on the airfield. I have no objection to the existing panels and like many residents would much prefer them to either houses or an industrial estate. But I do think the latest proposal of locating panels right up to both sides of Reepham Road is OTT. ( You can see the details on the Parish Council website).

However you look at it, farming is about converting sunlight into energy and solar panels are just another way of doing it. But there is a difference.

Traditional farm crops feed hungry people and while this proposed development may supply green energy it may well have a harmful effect on the value of your property and the earning potential of the four holiday sites in the village, whose visitors come to enjoy the delightful rural atmosphere the village has to offer them.



I have been lucky I have never had to carry arms or fight for my country but I believe the memories of our brave soldiers, sailors and airmen need cherishing, honouring and protecting, forever. Without them, my moaning about the government could have very serious consequences. I believe a compromise solution is both possible and will be found but my purpose in writing this is to find out what residents think of the proposals. A wide boulevard with a proper footpath and cycle track all the way to Reepham would work for me. But what would you like to see?



The government seems to have money to spend to encourage cycling and it would be helpful if LCC, WLDC the Parish Council could work together to make something worthwhile happen and protect the lovely open countryside feel that surrounds our village..

#### Cllr. Ian Fleetwood's - June's brief:

The latest on, what's happening in the public sector in Lincolnshire.

**Greater Lincolnshire devolution:** Lincolnshire County Council Leader Councillor Martin Hill has written to the Secretary of State for Local Government Robert Jenrick on behalf of the County Council, North East Lincolnshire and North Lincolnshire Councils concerning the issue of devolution. In Martin's letter, he said: "As we progress through to the recovery phase of this crisis there is going to be a need to grow the economy at a faster pace and to higher levels than before. "We recognise that to accomplish this we must be ready with plans to take advantage of opportunities for growth and transformation." The letter is the first step required by government, in order for them to initiate discussions about potential devolution and we await their response. Until we receive a response there is no formal action to be taken.

**Household Waste:** We've now had over 23,800 bookings for slots at Household Waste Recycling Centres, and have received some really positive feedback about how the new system works. From Friday 5<sup>th</sup> June you will be able to book up to seven days in advance and we've allocated certain days to certain waste types, which are now the same across the county. Care Homes, residents and loved ones: One of the most difficult things in care settings during lockdown has been maintaining contact between Care Home residents and their loved ones. I'm delighted that we have been able to provide 30 Facebook Portals to care homes and another 5 to supported living venues this week. The portals have been donated by NHSX as part of a national scheme, and I'm sure this will be a huge support in helping residents reach their families.

Supporting vulnerable people across Lincolnshire: One of our most notable achievements during the lockdown continues to be the way we've worked alongside partners and volunteers to support the most vulnerable people in our communities. While there are signs that the pandemic is easing, there's still a significant number of people across our county who are relying on this additional help during the lockdown. The collaborative efforts of the district-led Wellbeing Service and the Lincolnshire County Council Customer Service Centre are continuing to support those most impacted by the pandemic including the clinically most vulnerable group who are 'shielding'. The Covid-19 Helpline 01522 782189 remains operational seven days a week for those seeking support, information and advice, with over 4,000 calls answered since it went live in late March.

Gearing up to celebrate National Bike Month in June: I would like to encourage you to do what you can to be fit and healthy. It's an excellent way to travel as well as keep in shape and enjoy your surroundings. You will have seen recent Government announcements about the importance of cycling as a means of transport. We're lucky to be located in a county that is so bike-friendly and while the roads are relatively traffic-free, this is the ideal time for inexperienced cyclists to give it a go! Bike Month is about getting people to go out on their bikes, anywhere, any time and log the trip on the <a href="www.lovetoride.net/lincolnshire">www.lovetoride.net/lincolnshire</a> website. It would be fantastic to see as many of you as possible getting on two wheels. It's such a brilliant way to de-stress as well as take exercise. Why not set yourself a target such as riding a certain number of miles during the month?

Prizes can be won for setting goals and logging rides, and for people that encourage a non-cyclist to get on their bike and log a ride, they will be entered into the prize draw to give £500 to the winner's chosen Bikes for Key Workers or Community Coronavirus Support initiative. Want to do Outdoor Activities - New getting outside safely website launches: The Ordnance Survey has joined forces with Natural England to create <a href="The Getting Outside during Covid-19">The Getting Outside during Covid-19</a> website to bring together current advice from Government, Councils and other outdoor organisations, to help you decide where to go and what to do in the open air.

The site enables people to search by activity and location for suggestions and ideas about how they can enjoy the outside safely. So search Lincolnshire and see what you can find! https://getoutside.ordnancesurvey.co.uk/covid/

What does Test and Trace mean? Anyone who tests positive for coronavirus will be contacted by NHS Test and Trace and will need to share information about their recent interactions. This could include household members, people with whom they have been in direct contact, or within two metres of for more than 15 minutes.

They will be given instructions on how to share details of people they've been in close, recent contact with and places they have visited and will be asked to provide this information online via a secure website or over the phone with an NHS contact tracer. Anyone identified to have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive for coronavirus will be alerted by the NHS Test and Trace service via text or email. They will then be given details about logging on to the NHS Test and Trace website.

People identified as having been in close contact with someone who has had a positive test must stay at home for 14 days, even if they do not have symptoms, to stop unknowingly spreading the virus. If those in isolation develop symptoms, they can book a test at <a href="www.nhs.uk/conditions/coronavirus-covid-19/testing-for-coronavirus/">www.nhs.uk/conditions/coronavirus-covid-19/testing-for-coronavirus/</a> or by calling 119. If they test positive, they must continue to stay at home for seven days or until their symptoms have passed. If they test negative, they must complete the 14-day isolation period. Members of their household will not have to stay at home unless the person identified becomes symptomatic, at which point they must also self-isolate for 14 days to avoid unknowingly spreading the virus.

#### **Coronavirus testing**

Anyone who is showing coronavirus symptoms is eligible to book a swab test to find out if they have the virus. For more details please go to <a href="https://www.gov.uk/guidance/coronavirus-covid-19-getting-tested">https://www.gov.uk/guidance/coronavirus-covid-19-getting-tested</a>.
